### Achamore Gardens update from Bryony White

As the seasons pass and I get to know Achamore more, the garden throws up continual surprises with new plants coming to the fore. Every time I'm in the gardens I notice a new flash of colour that draws my attention and has me asking "what on earth are you?" This month's biggest surprise is both a Beauty and a Beast. The plant has soft, furry, pink, new leaves which beg to be stroked, and when you crush the leaves they release an intoxicating scent of lemons, but beware! The whole plant covered in vicious thorns and even that soft new growth has spikes on its underside. After a bit of research, I learned that this is one of the *Zanthoxylums*, better known as Sichuan pepper, a key ingredient in Chinese 5-spice mix and a close relative of the citrus family, hence that lovely smell. Unlike the more familiar black peppercorns, in Sichuan pepper only the thin husks of the seeds are eaten, not the inner core, and the plants aren't self-fertile, meaning that we would need both male and female plants to get seeds, so it's unlikely that we will be harvesting our own Sichuan peppers anytime soon. With more than 250 species in the *Zanthoxylum* family, I haven't quite managed to identify it to species level, but I'll continue the investigations. If you'd like to see our very own Beauty and Beast, you'll find it in the walled garden at the bottom of the border near the south gate.



Another superstar plant from earlier this month was the Pohutukawa or New Zealand Christmas Tree, *Metrosideros excelsa*\*. The New Zealand Christmas tree is revered in Maori tradition where it is considered to be the Chiefs tree, symbolising power, strength and beauty, and it's crimson flowers represent the blood of a young warrior who perished trying to avenge his father's death. When Christian settlers arrived in New Zealand they quickly adopted it as it flowers around Christmas time in the southern summer and the Pohutukawa is now much loved by New Zealanders at home and abroad. The fluffy, red flowers are composed of many stamens and it is rich in nectar as evidenced by how crazy Achamore's bees were for it when it was in flower – the buzzing around the tree was extraordinary.



\*Some of our New Zealand followers on the Achamore Gardens Facebook page suspect that our tree may, in fact, be *Metrosideros umbalalta*, the Southern Rata. More investigation required!

Away from the amazing array of flowers, there's been a lot of insect activity around the gardens. Having moved from a fairly rural part of the central belt, I didn't really expect there to be much difference in the insects, but I've been amazed both by the diversity of insect life and the sheer volume of insects, both in the gardens and across the wider island. Gigha's insect biomass per acre must be vastly higher than an equivalent area on the mainland! Of particular note this month have been the dragonflies, damsel flies and darters. They move so fast that it's really hard to properly identify them, never mind get a decent picture, but this male Gold Ringed Dragonfly obliged for a few seconds. They are huge dragonflies, considered to be the longest in the UK, and are more like helicopters or drones buzzing around the garden – they've taken me by surprise on more than one occasion.

And finally... Last month I promised you a photo of Rhododendron "Polar Bear" in full bloom. I'm glad to say it didn't disappoint and I hope you took the chance to go and enjoy in and sniff it's beautiful scent.
