Gigha Hotel

Following the grant award of £247k from the Community Ownership Fund, we are now working with an architect to prepare detailed drawings of the new pub/function space. These plans are still being prepared and will be shared with the community when available.

Works continue to progress with the development of an official emergency services landing pad at the airfield. The Royal Engineers are due to begin their work at the end of March and stay for a 2-week period to complete the works. ZCG have also set up a sustainability library within Gigha Hotel. The bookshelf contains a variety of books on sustainable living, food growing, amongst a whole host of other things. Renewables

The gearbox replacement on T2 has been delayed again because of the weather. It is hoped that this will be replaced by the end of February.

A bearing has gone on the main shaft on T1 which will require the blades to be removed to carry out this repair. It is hoped to have the work carried out while the crane is on site for the gearbox replacement on T2.

MUGA

The MUGA project is still ongoing, although progress has slowed down due to a previous lack of funding opportunities. Some new funding routes have been identified and applications are in the process of being submitted. The Parent Council have been working hard to continue fundraising and are close to reaching their £5k target! The planning application has been delayed since its submission in September, but we hope to receive a decision soon.

Achamore Gardens

Any January visitors to Achamore Gardens will encounter wafts of fragrance as they wander through our woodland and walled garden. Witch hazel, Daphne, Sarcococca and Mahonia are all something to be sniffed at!

The cold at this time of year means it's better to keep on the move and attempt energetic tasks. We've been keeping our volunteers busy by extending the dead hedge mentioned last month. This winding wall of brash can shelter young shrubs from harsh winds so we will introduce Rhododendron species and cultivars under its protection, in the Spring.

The New Year storms brought about the forced closure of the gardens. Large hanging tree limbs dangle over paths, as do leaning uprooted trees. Where the gardens team can, we have removed and processed fallen trunks, but many damaged trees require experienced professional attention.

Please note that the entrance path, main drive and walled garden have reopened but all other areas of the garden south of the drive and south of the machine sheds will remain closed for now. Barriers will block off unsafe areas.

Serious damage has been caused to one of Colonel Horlick's most prized plants, Rhododendron 'Lady Horlick', has suffered a potentially fatal hit, and one of her two main stems has been blown down. In other areas of the Gardens, it is quite miraculous that torn off tree limbs have missed important plant specimen. For now, we are hopeful we have dodged the worst of the winter weather, touch wood!














Isle of Gigha Ranger Service

Let's start this year's first newsletter with a review of 2023. We had a fabulous time! It was our best year yet for volunteer hours, from 108 hours in 2021 to 386 in 2023! We would not be able to achieve anywhere near as much without this amazing, dedicated team of people who give up their time to make

Gigha a better place.



Our 2023 volunteer celebration was sadly scuppered by the weather affecting ferries before Christmas, but we were able to deliver a delicious afternoon tea, made by Wild Chameleon, to our volunteers as a small thank you for all their help.



This was also the first year that funding was awarded to Ranger Service projects, a whopping £250,000! £248,000 for our invasive non-native species and hedgerow project, and £2000 to continue Forest School for another 12 months.

We are so looking forward to exciting things to come in 2024!

To kick off the new year, we have been blessed with a few weeks of great wildlife. Most notably the hen harriers that are around just now. There have been sightings of males north of the village and females at the north of the island. Hen harriers are fabulous creatures, with an elegant but twisty flight and hunting pattern, and long thin wings with primary feathers, making them look like fingers. At the moment, their hunting behaviour is rife, trying to fatten for the breeding season, and being more visible simply because it's winter with less food about, so hunting more regularly. We only really see these during the winter months. We think this is because Gigha doesn't have quite enough nesting habitat. These are ground nesting birds that prefer thick, high vegetation among moorland, and sometimes

along woodland edges for a little bit of shelter. However, we're a bit short of that here on Gigha, and unfortunately our predatory creatures such as mink, can decimate ground nesting birds. That being said, we haven't spotted any mating behaviour, so perhaps they have better sites elsewhere.

Female or juvenile hen harrier. Identifiable by brown plumage and mottled bellies. Males are blue grey with

white rump and black wing tips.





Upholding tradition, our January Forest School session was based around birds in honour of the RSPB's Big Garden Bird Watch being held between 26th and 28th of the month. The amazing forest schoolers made an incredible bird table to help our feathery friends during the harsh winter months, and were so brilliant with all the tools, and their determination was second to none! The table can currently be found in Achamore Gardens near to the machine sheds if you fancy setting up for the bird watch there! Our next Forest School session will be held in March.

Gigha Primary School & Early Learning Centre

We have been very busy since returning to school after the Christmas break. Pupils have written letters in response to the decision to no longer send the Screen Machine to Gigha following funding cuts. Pupils practiced their skills of persuasive writing in trying to persuade ministers to restore this service.

We have also now ordered all the equipment to allow us to keep chickens and these will be arriving after the February break. This will help teach pupils many life skills including caring for animals and preparing simple meals using the eggs we collect. We also hope to visit local farms in the summer term to learn about diversification and locally produced food options.

In the ELC pupils have been joining with Rhunahaorine ELC for collaborative learning opportunities. This has included visits to the soft play, Campbeltown library and also swimming lessons at the Aqualibrium. This has been a fantastic opportunity which we hope to continue into the summer term.

More recently pupils have been learning all about Robert Burns and have practiced poems. This week we held a Burns Day soup and sandwiches where we were joined by elders from the island. Pupils each took a role in chopping vegetables, buttering bread and adding fillings. Younger pupils also helped to design their own tartan which were laminated as placemats. Two pupils read poems and we all listened carefully to poems and the Selkirk Grace read to us. The pupils enjoyed hosting visitors into school and hope to make this a monthly event.
