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8. GREL/ GGPL Boards to continue exploring succession planning for the turbine income.	An Options Appraisal was carried out for GREL through the HIE framework. The report recommendation is to replace the 3 V27 turbines with 2 V52's. GREL is working with HIE to secure further funding to contract consultants to provide project management and
	technical support to continue the planning of this project.
9. Begin the island wide Woodland Management Plan.	A contractor has been engaged and an outline survey has been drafted on the existing woodlands. Further consultation work will be delivered to gauge ideas and interest in the future of Gigha's woodlands.
10. Engage volunteers in environmental projects and promote low carbon initiatives where possible.	The Ranger service now offers activities and events to help promote and protect our natural and cultural heritage, as well as introducing ways to protect Gigha's environment. The Trust is working with a community-led Net Zero group to review ideas and opportunities.
11. Review opportunities for EV charging points.	The Trust secured a grant from HIE in February 2022 to purchase, install and commission a public EV charge point. The work has been contracted to the same contractor that is due to install the PV panels at the Activity Centre and campsite later this year. The EV charging point is to be located at the campsite.
12. Launch new Visit Gigha marketing platforms and ensure all island businesses are well represented.	A new Visit Gigha website and social media platforms were launched in early 2022 with support from the ScotGrad programme. The platforms aim to promote local businesses as well as targeting sustainable travellers.
13. Continue promotion of the Gigha Community Fund to support small island projects and initiatives.	The Fund has and will continue to support small community projects and initiatives that support a thriving Gigha community.
14. Continue regular reviewing of policies and risks.	An Action Plan for policies and risk assessments has been prepared and is being reviewed and implemented.
15. Facilitate skills development and training opportunities for staff, directors, and residents.	Training opportunities have been offered through the Gateway to Gigha project. IGHT staff members are also offered opportunities to undertake additional training direct to their role. Annual staff appraisal feedback is helping to form a training programme.
16. Continue the process of reviewing core costs and achieving value for money.	Professional fees are continually reviewed, including accountancy and land management fees. The Trust continues to use on island contractors wherever possible.
