COMMUNITY OPINION SURVEY – ARCHAEOLOGICAL WORKS AT CARN BAN

Earlier this month, an opinion survey was sent out to every houselhold regarding archaeological works at Scheduled Monument, Carn Ban cist (SM3182). The result of the survey came back as a majority **DO NOT APPROVE.**

- 13 households (28 individuals) selected APPROVE.
- 20 households (37 individuals) selected DO NOT APPROVE.

It has been agreed that these works will not go ahead, but the archaeological team will be invited to update current records without interference or disturbance to the site.

We appreciate your understanding and continued support as we work together to restore full fire cover for Gigha."




Dark Skies Gigha

We have been taking a wee break this last month after a very busy summer but volunteers are now gearing up for our annual Dark Skies Festival in November. The theme is Celestial Stories and we hope to share as many star stories from different cultures as we can along with some of our usual astronomy talks and stargazing sessions. Island Ranger Service

Well September has not been its usual sunny self this year, but the change of colour is always a welcome sight, and with the light now dramatically changing the summer season is certainly over. However! This is our favourite time of year, as the trees produce all their seeds and fruits, the conkers are falling already and the haws and rowans are bringing some startling reds to our landscape, this is definitely a bumper year for them. We also are treated to the best views of the milky way in the autumn, specifically around the autumn equinox. The best part is, no one needs to stay awake until after midnight to see this spectacle in full force – hooray!



This month, the Edinburgh Young Walkers returned for a third year. It always such a pleasure to host them and boy do they work hard! This time we set them to processing and burning some of the Rhododendron ponticum cuttings that have been sitting in the woodland opposite the Fire Station, and they managed to get through almost half the amount, which was one mammoth task! We then headed to the woodland near Leim to clear brambles to make way for the trees that are naturally regenerating, to strengthen the scrub habitat for our nesting birds, create rides and glades and encourage species such as nettles for our butterfly species. This section of woodland is turning into such a wildlife delight, and the team made a huge difference just in an hour! It didn't end there, we took a stroll to the headland at Grob Bagh (Leim), where we had a cuppa and kept our eyes peeled for some cetaceans. Despite paying them, the wildlife didn't show, but the team were keen to head to the beach and remove hundreds of nurdles that have recently washed ashore. Nurdles are 'virgin' plastic material in the form of very small balls which are used to make almost all plastic products. These are often leached into the environment through damages or mishandling of containers during shipping, but also at many stages through the supply chain. These are infamous for harming wildlife as they are mistaken for food, being incredibly difficult to remove from the ocean environment, and can cause toxic pollution. So go team for collecting so many! We sincerely hope they come back again next year, even just for a social visit. Thank you to everyone who joined us!

Achamore Gardens

It is very noticeable that autumn has arrived here at Achamore. The plants have slowed down their growing and the trees have started dropping their leaves. Our to-do list changes to reflect this: we start to clear and collect fallen leaves; check our drainage ditches and pipes, ready the winter's rain; cut and resow our wildflower meadows; and will soon the lawns will receive their last cut of the year.

Our work over the last month has included resurfacing sections of pump house track. By raising the path, we hope to reduce issues with flooding and make the path a bit less mucky and slippery to walk on.

The nursery has undergone a bit of a revamp. We have opened up an unused area that was covered in self-seeded buddleia, making space for the plants we have been potting up. Almost all of these have been propagated from seed or cutting by our team and are being grown-on to be planted out in the wider garden.

Gigha Primary School & ELC

Last week was the Great British Beach Clean and to mark this the pupils from Gigha Primary School completed a beach clean at Cuddyport Beach with Island Ranger, Casey-Jo. This beach was chosen because of the higher levels of marine plastic that some of the southern beach's experience. Over the period of an hour pupils collected over 29kg of marine litter including everything from plastic strapping, rope, fish boxes, oil drums, and plastic sheeting, to shoes, tyres, and even a tennis racket! Where possible this will be recycled to reduce landfill waste. Our pupils are currently working towards their Beach and Marine Litter Project Award with The Grab Trust and this beach clean forms a part of this.



This term we were also very lucky to host a visit from Jim Parkin from Aardman Animations. He talked to us about his career and the many different roles that went in to producing some of his favourite films. We learnt about character design and how these are brought to life using stop motion animation techniques. After designing our own characters in plasticine, we spent some of the afternoon making our own stop motion films with Mrs Flett using special software in the iPads. Article 31 ensures that all children should have the right to creative arts and activities, and this opportunity has given our children another way of engaging their creative talents.

In ELC, our children have continued to learn about people in our local community who help us. Pupils enjoyed their recent visit to the Coastguard station where they found out about the role of the Coastguard in keeping us safe. Pupils also got to look at special equipment which the Coastguard use; this theme this has been reflected in our role play area in the ELC where pupils have made boats, a police station and a hospital.

After a busy term we are looking forward to our October break and look forward to updating you on our progress when we return.
